28 Sunday - B - 14 October 2018 WHERE THE HEART IS

Would you consider buying a cream that can instantly make you look 20 years younger? A bottle of pills that guarantees to reduce your weight by 10 pounds per week? Or a tape that promises to have you fluent in Spanish within a month?

We all know in our heart of hearts that this is all rubbish. It couldn't be true and these types of claims never materialise. But we still get hooked on them anyway, just on the off chance that we might strike lucky. Our attraction to adverts like this says a lot about us. It shows where our values really lie, what we really want out of life, what we expect for ourselves in an ideal world.

Today's scripture readings challenge us on our priorities. What is it that occupies most of our waking hours? Is it dreaming of wealth and riches, of a bigger house, a faster car, a purple dishwasher and an avocado fridge? Or have we cottoned onto the fact that all of these material possessions may lighten our load a bit, but can never bring us happiness. True happiness, or wisdom of heart as the bible calls it, consists in knowing what is important in life and what is mere padding. The Book of Wisdom says that knowledge and love of God is better even than health or beauty, that pure silver is as mud, and riches pale into insignificance.

It's easy to get caught up in the thought patterns of a world that does not believe in a life after death. If there were no afterlife then it would be quite understandable to go for bust in this life. But what Jesus promises his followers is an eternal life, a quality of existence that will never cease. That's why our idea of what is important does not always square with what is presented to us via TV and radio commercials and in the newspapers and magazines.

Those who seek this wisdom of God are happy to live by the commandments of God, to weigh carefully the pros and cons of what passes for sophistication, and to place their hope in God's promise of eternal happiness. That's why the psalmist urgently sings his prayer:

Lord, make us know the shortness of our life, that we may gain wisdom of heart.


