Imagine adults when the disciples were preaching and baptizing. They came to baptism not really knowing who they were, with pasts that were broken, seeking to live the joy of the Gospel they heard spoken to them and wanting the love they saw witnessed in the lives of those who believed. What tremendous celebrations their baptisms must have been! They could now have the support of a community, full participation in the sacraments of the church, focus for their disordered lives, consolation, healing, and an understanding of what life is really all about.

Our lives are meant to be celebrations of the Spirit we have received in Baptism. How does that joy get expressed in and through you? When we truly understand that we have put on Christ, our burdens can become much lighter. It is odd that so many Christians look like they are carrying the weight of the world on their shoulders. Wouldn't it be wonderful if those weights could be lifted and joy experienced

## Church to Re-Open for Public Masses from Monday 6th July



#### Let's Begin Together

We are all looking forward to gathering together again but in a safe way. Over the last number of weeks we have been working hard to prepare our Church for the 'New Normal' so that we can open safely. We have been appealing also for volunteers for the many stewards and cleaning teams that will be required. Thank You to those who have responded. I am delighted to announce that we begin a phased re-opening over the next number of months. The First Public Mass (with a restriction of a total number within the Church of 70 people) will be on **Monday 6<sup>th</sup> July with Mass also on Tuesday, Thursday and Friday of that week**. The First Public Sunday Mass will be on the **12<sup>th</sup> July** at 10 AM. Clearly these times can change depending on the public health advice and on the number of volunteers available at any one time.

We will be encouraging people, where they can, to come to the weekday day Masses rather than on Sunday. Due to the limit on numbers it will not always be possible to accommodate everyone.

We ask People to

- \*Follow the directions of the Stewards:
- \*Practice social distancing,
- \*Sanitise hands on the way in and out;

\*Enter by front door and exit by side chapel door;

\*Wear a face covering in the Church where possible;

\*Holy Communion will be distributed after Mass as you are leaving the Church;

\*No congregational singing,

\*Provision of Tea afterwards is suspended for now

\*Use of the Bathroom is by request:

\*If you not feeling well please do not come to the Church;

\*If you have any underlying medical conditions you may wish to continue watching Mass via our web cam.

After the great feasts of Easter, Ascension, Pentecost & Corpus Christy we are once again in 'Ordinary Time'. Ordinary Time is not called "ordinary" based on its level of importance. The origin of the name comes from the Latin word *ordinalis*, which means "numbered." It signifies a numbered (or ordered) list of Sundays that anchor our daily worship.

The readings, liturgy and prayer of Ordinary Time can be a rich opportunity to reflect upon our relationship with God and with each other, and to grow in depth on many levels. Creighton University Online Ministries has a huge variety of helpful resources for prayer in Ordinary Time.
